**19. OPEN CINEMA, In The Shadow of Gold Mountain and Head Tax**

14/03/05 Victoria, BC - On Tuesday, April 5th, OPEN CINEMA will commemorate the traditional Chinese Ancestors' Spring Renewal Festival, Ching Ming, with the Victoria premiere screening of a new National Film Board documentary, *In The Shadow Of Gold Mountain*, which will be followed by a discussion about the Head Tax Redress Movement with UVic Professor Emeritus and Order of Canada recipient Dr. David Lai, and Victoria City Councillor Charlayne Thornton Joe in attendance.

This moving documentary, directed by Karen Cho, sheds light on an era that shaped the identity of generations of Chinese in Canada. From 1885 until 1947, while Canada encouraged and rewarded immigration from Europe, it imposed laws that singled out the Chinese as unwanted and unwelcome. Cho's film, a rich melding of history, poetry and raw emotion, takes her from Montreal to Vancouver to uncover stories from the last living survivors of the *Chinese Head Tax and Exclusion Act*.

At the centre of the film are personal accounts of extraordinary Chinese Canadians who survived an era that threatened to eradicate their entire community. With deeply moving testimonials, it reveals the profound ways in which this history still casts its shadow.

"Head Tax Redress is still a disputed and divided issue in the Chinese Canadian community." says Dr Lai, who has carried out extensive research on the Head Tax. "*In The Shadow Of Gold Mountain* illustrates

effectively the opinions of those people who want individual compensation but it does not show the opinions of a greater majority of the Chinese Canadians." Dr Lai will be on hand to discuss these issues after the screening, along with Vancouver's Sid Chow Tan, a director of the Chinese Canadian National Council, and a member of its National Redress Committee.
